Planning Council Re-cap

In February, members of the OCK Planning Council participated in a virtual meeting to hear updates on project implementation and discuss potential training needs. Staff from the KDHE Division of Healthcare Finance reported that they were able to provide testimony to the Kansas Senate Health Committee as well as the Bethell KanCare Oversight Committee in February. In both sessions, legislators expressed significant support for the OCK initiative and a willingness to be flexible in the implementation date to assure a quality program. While the process for identifying a target population to be served is ongoing, potential providers are encouraged to begin the application process by downloading an electronic version of the form from the OCK website. The Planning Council identified topics for ongoing training opportunities related to specific requirements of the program, in addition to requesting early technical assistance opportunities related to the completion of the Provider Application and Health Action Plan forms. A Special Note...

Measles

The CDC reminds us that measles outbreaks continue in the U.S. The following information can help you and your loved ones stay safe.

Learn the Symptoms

Measles starts with fever, runny nose, cough, red eyes, and sore throat. It's followed by a rash that spreads over the body. Measles is highly contagious and spreads through coughing and sneezing.

Parents and Caregivers

Learn about measles, the vaccine to prevent it, and the importance of vaccinating according to CDC's recommended schedule.

Healthcare Providers

Consider measles in patients with a fever, rash, and cough, coryza and conjunctivitis — the three "C"s. Ask if they are vaccinated against measles and whether they have recently traveled internationally or if there's measles in the community.

Travelers

Measles remains a common disease in many parts of the world. Anyone who is not protected against measles is at risk of getting infected when they travel internationally. Make sure you and your family are up to date on measles vaccination.
